



## **St Simon and St Jude CE Primary School**

### **PE and Sports premium 2023-2024 with impacts**

#### **What is the Sports Premium?**

The Government is providing funding of £150 million per annum to provide new, substantial primary school sport funding. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, and will see money going directly to primary school Headteachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children. The sport funding can only be spent on sport and PE provision in schools.

This funding will be ring fenced, and will be allocated directly to primary schools across England, providing them with dedicated resource to buy in invaluable expertise and support. Funding will be allocated through a lump sum for each, St Simon and St Jude CE Primary will receive a lump sum of £17,000 in 22-23

#### **Purpose of funding**

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer. This means that you should use the premium to:

- develop or add to the PE and sport activities that your school already offers
- make improvements now that will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

For example, you can use your funding to:

- hire qualified sports coaches to work with teachers
- provide existing staff with training or resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively
- introduce new sports or activities and encourage more pupils to take up sport
- support and involve the least active children by running or extending school sports clubs, holiday clubs and Change4Life clubs
- run sport competitions
- increase pupils' participation in the School Games
- run sports activities with other schools

### How will we be spending the Sports Premium and who will benefit?

The Governors agree that the money must be used so that: all children benefit regardless of sporting ability; that the higher attaining children are given the opportunity to compete in advanced tournaments; that staff have access to training opportunities and continued professional development. We also agree that all children should be encouraged to develop healthy lifestyles.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• The school has continued to work with high quality coaches from Future Schools Fitness to develop staff CPD.</li><li>• Across the year the school has worked Future Schools Fitness to offer after school clubs weekly.</li><li>• The school has worked with Funstar to provide a dance and gymnastic club to pupils in both Key Stage 1 and 2.</li><li>• The school has taken pupils in Key Stage 2 to sporting competitions with local schools.</li><li>• The school worked with Woodykins to offer outdoor adventurous activities as part of curriculum time and as an after school club.</li><li>• 78% of pupils are working at the expected standard in PE, 6% are working at greater depth</li><li>• Mental health activities were a regular feature of the newsletter.</li><li>• Mental health and work with mental health practitioners from NHS supporting children across the school.</li><li>• The PE curriculum is well planned and delivered, resources are readily available and support teaching and learning. The PE hub is used for our PE Curriculum.</li><li>• Y6 pupils went swimming this year.</li><li>• A range of lunch time interventions have support pupils across the school to be more active with a midday supervisor taking the lead.</li><li>• Interventions have taken place for pupils in EYFS and Y1 to develop gross motor skills.</li><li>• All children have had the chance to take part in outdoor and adventurous activities off site.</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Pupils to have the opportunity to take part in sporting events and a wider range of after school active clubs.</li><li>• School to consolidate the work done this year and investigate further opportunities for pupil leadership of PE/Sport</li><li>• Pupils who are less active to be identified and supported to attend clubs/competitive events</li></ul>
